## **Monday 30 November 2015 at Herbert Smith Freehills**

“Current Issues in Documentary Evidence”

### **Charles Hollander QC – Brick Court Chambers**

Charles Hollander QC from Brick Court Chambers will consider current issues and recent case law developments relating to privilege, disclosure and documentary evidence.

“The Privacy Paradox: can privacy law cope with emerging technology?”

### **Timothy Pitt-Payne QC – 11 King’s Bench Walk Chambers**

Timothy Pitt-Payne QC from 11 King’s Bench Walk will speak about the paradox of privacy law and its ability to keep pace with modern technology. On the one hand, privacy law is becoming increasingly assertive and ambitious: the CJEU has abolished the Safe Harbour scheme for transferring personal data to the US and the Court of Appeal has recognised a tort of misuse of private information, and has opened the way for mass litigation for distress in data breach cases. Yet at the same time we are repeatedly told that in an age of cloud computing, big data, and the Internet of Things, privacy is dead and privacy law is futile.

## **Wednesday 20 January 2016 at Hogan Lovells**

“Arbitration Agreements: pitfalls to avoid and a cautionary case study”

### **Sa’ad Hossain QC and David Caplan – One Essex Court Chambers**

Sa’ad Hossain QC will discuss overlapping arbitration clauses and the centre of gravity test. Sa’ad will review the “centre of gravity” approach to the allocation of jurisdiction in transactions with multiple arbitration clauses and will also consider potential pitfalls when deciding which clause to invoke. David Caplan will consider a case study on multiple arbitration agreements and address an ongoing long-running saga which illustrates the potential difficulties and pitfalls of the existence of multiple arbitration agreements.

“Commercial Fraud Litigation: Update”

### **Paul McGrath QC – Essex Court Chambers**

Paul McGrath QC, author of “Commercial Fraud in Civil Practice”, from Essex Court Chambers will discuss recent developments in commercial fraud litigation and will also consider current issues relating to a key aspect of successful commercial fraud litigation: securing the assets pending judgment and enforcing any subsequent judgment against those assets.
